During the 2010 election campaign, Hungarian Fidesz Leader Viktor Orban called for a "Second Change of the System" -- a reference to what Fidesz saw as an incomplete move away from the communist regime in 1989. Since last April, as Prime Minister, Orban has pushed through controversial changes to the constitution, introduced a media law that many regard as restrictive, enacted a retroactive -- in some cases 95% -- taxation on the former governments' "golden parachute" pensions, curtailed the Constitutional Court's authority over budgetary matters, offered Hungarian passports for ethnic Hungarians living in neighboring countries, issued surtaxes on the financial sector, and rejected recommendations by the IMF and the European Union. Are these changes the execution of Orban's vision of a "second change of the system" in order to complete Hungary's democratic transition? Or are they, as critics in Hungary and throughout Europe claim, a dangerous lurch to the right that threatens the underpinnings of Hungarian democracy? Hear leading officials and experts explore these sensitive and difficult questions.
