A world power in the 1600's, actively engaged from South America to Africa, India and East Asia, modern Portugal has inherited a global outlook and an identity which is both European and Atlanticist. It is a founding member of NATO, a member of the European Union, an active partner of the Community of Portuguese Speaking Countries (CPLP), a member of the Ibero-American Community and a close neighbor and partner in promoting reform in North Africa and the Middle East. Portugal currently holds a seat as a non-permanent member of the United Nations Security Council.
